American Indian Resource Center	An Evening in the Diaspora: Oklahoma Indian Storytellers in Performance is an event with four Oklahoma Indian storytellers to participate in an unprecedented cultural event that speaks to the forces of diasporization in Native communities in California and beyond. Speakers include: Robert J. Conley, Arigon Starr, Gayle Ross, and Time Tingle. The goal of this project is to give students an understanding of how cultures are replicated in the face of widespread diasporization and conquest, and how cultures that have been colonized are carrying on traditions that have continued to exist throughout history. The project addresses, in a unique setting, cultural exchange, intercultural dialogue, aspects of humor and healing in the space of being far away from home. American Indian Resource Center	Decolonizing Film: Indigenous Filmmakers Speak an event to expose the University community to Indigenous filmmaking and Indigenous filmmakers. This event is to show how Indigenous peoples have been predominantly portrayed through film in stereotypical and oppressive ways that has detrimentally effected how indigenous people perceive themselves. This event allows indigenous people the autonomy to represent themselves in healthy and productive ways is an act of decolonization that is helping to heal indigenous communities and balance the representation of indigenous peoples in the media. Angry Asian Man, Phil Yu's visit will include a presentation/lecture, Q&A discussion, and reception. This event is in collaboration with Professor L.S. Kim in Film and Digital Media. Asian American/Pacific Islander Resource Center	Angry Little Girls with Lela Lee will address the stereotype of Asians as the quiet model minority who do not experience racism, while at the same time confronting the expectation of girls to be polite, and "well-behaved, attractive objects." The program will include a presentation/lecture by Lela Lee, Q&A discussion, as well as a reception and signing. This event is a collaboration between the AA/PIRC and Women's Center. El Centro: the Chicana/o Latina/o Resource Center	Susana Baca: The African Diaspora in Latino America. The historical legacy of slavery and migration is one that permeates Latino America. Latino cultural roots, especially in terms of music is one that is clearly evident when one listens to the variations of music from cumbia, salsa, folk music, and Latin jazz. Exploring this legacy and the relationship of the mestizaje (which includes Indigenous, Spanish and Portuguese, and African roots) is one that is not often acknowledged and touched upon when we discuss Latino identity. This event combines a workshop on the roots of Afro Peruvian music and Baca's passion for researching and keeping this legacy alive, along with an evening performance where Baca would include the campus in a musical journey that traces these roots musically. Students would be able to experience this music tangibly and gain a reference point of the Diaspora that makes up Latino America. El Centro: the Chicana/o Latina/o Resource Center	Con La Voca Abrieta is a three part film and expressive arts Festival focused on the Latino Queer Experience. This is a collaborative effort between El Centro and Familia X with film screenings the first night from Aurora Guerrero (Pura Lengua) followed by a panel discussion with director. The second night is a spoken word night with poetry, artistic expression and followed by a reception. Speakers include Pablo Alvarez, Yosimar Reyes, and Meliza Bañales. The third night will focus on intersex and the transgendered Latino experience with film screenings of XXY by Lucia Puenzo and Juchitan: Queer Paradise by Patricio Henriquez. The series employs longitudinal and auto-ethnographic documentary filming. This series educates audiences with unprecedented access to the lives and experiences of self identified effeminate male activists, artists, professionals and educators; perspectives rarely discussed within the larger queer communities, gay communities, and the academic world. The program will bring the director of the web series to present a hi-lights reel film, include a classroom lecture by the director, and a reception with students to discuss the web series. This event will bring Mayda Del Valle who is an acclaimed poet and actress who won the Nuyorican Grand Slam Championship, and is an original cast member and writer of the Tony award winning production of Russell Simmons Def Jam Poetry on Broadway, and has performed at the Whitehouse. The workshop will have skit performances to demonstrate different types of violence and abuse, include a guest speaker. Guest speaker Abby Leibman whose sister Nina Leibman was murdered by her husband Ken Donney in October 1995 in the Santa Cruz district. Nina Leibman was a professor of film and television studies at UCSC.
